## Guest Speaker Dr Helen Jones “Save the Rhino”

Introduced by host Rob Pannell

The number of Rhinos being killed in Zimbabwe has steadily declined since 2011 due to the awareness program

An ongoing problem is monies raised is lost to corruption in parts of Africa

With the decline in numbers poachers have become sophisticated by flying in and out by helicopter

The University of Pretoria and Save the Rhino foundation are dehorning the Rhinos themselves and storing them to try off put poachers

Rhino Horns regrow in three to four years
