




Meeting Notes & News 2021/22

Answer to Last Week's Very Tricky 'Can' Puzzle

The Puzzle: In the cupboard, there are four cans containing: *Chicken Chunkies* dog food, *Tom Piper* beef stew, *Tuna Delight* cat food, and *Planters* cashew nuts. The cans are of identical shape and size and, unfortunately — due to a prank by your nephew — all of the cans' labels have been mixed up, so each one has one of the other's labels on it. Is it possible for you to find out the contents of each can by opening only one?

The Solution: Yes! It *is* possible. Here's how:
First, find the lightest one; shake it around a bit. If it rattles, that must be the cashew nuts. Then, open your *one* can — the one that has the 'cashew nut' label — to find out what's inside. That will leave you with only two unidentified cans. Because of the prank, you know the cans all have the wrong labels, so you can now work out which is which.

For example:

Let's say the cashews have the 'dog food' label and the can you open, with the 'cashew nut' label, is *actually* full of cat food. That would mean that the *contents* of the two cans you haven't identified must be (1) beef stew and (2) dog food. At the same time, the *labels* on the two remaining cans will be for 'beef stew' and 'cat food'. Since the can labelled 'cat food' *can't possibly contain* cat food, it *must* be full of beef stew, meaning the final can must be full of dog food. Bon Appétit !
